The attending judges and representatives from DCI were each given a beautifully decorated "snack bag" that was put together by Charlotte Hollenbeck. Each bag contained several simple snacking types of goodies, waters and cheese that just happened to bear the sticker "Real California Cheese." It was fun seeing so many former Corps members, families, fans and friends, especially the Odello family and Gwen Seawright.

This was the first time we had a chance to see the show since Stockton and we knew there would be a lot of changes. We will have to admit that while watching the run through, we had the famous "Jerry Seawright ducky bumps" throughout the entire performance.

Saturday afternoon found us happily participating in the Back 40 BBQ that was held. To the delight of everyone present, the brass and percussion lines came over and gave a short performance. Afterwards we went to the stadium for the First-Ever California Regional competition! In talking to the Corps members, they knew where they had made the mistake and said they would take care of it and make sure it didn't happen again.

The next time we were able to be with the Corps was on Monday in Pasadena. We got there later in the afternoon as we had driven down. We went over to Devil's Food to see how Carol Vargas was doing and was greeted with the fact that the refrigeration had totally shut down. However, the school was very accommodating in letting us use their "Satellite Room" which had loads of refrigerators, freezers and an ice machine!! It was a healthy walk each way, but we had no complaints. Thom Lambertson took on the chore of collecting all the uniform parts in order that they could be washed. We did get a chance to watch the run through and knew it was going to be an exciting week. Tuesday was a day spent mostly in Devil's Food and greeting everyone who came by. What a joy to see so many former members, friends and parents. We, of course, watched the run through. Sheryl Miles had a very busy day taking care of all the tour details, doing the mail run, etc.

Wednesday was I&E Day (Individual and Ensemble competition). We had several members participating and were anxiously waiting to hear how they did. They came back with four (4!!) first-place awards. We are always amazed at the dedication of these kids as they have to spend so much time with the regular show and then work on their routines on top of that. Carol Vargas was officially informed that the next morning there was going to be an Alumni Breakfast with the Corps and there would also be approximately 60 Japanese guests for lunch. – Didn't phase her one bit; she's good!!

Thursday: Not sure how many alumni attended the breakfast – all we know is that we were making four kinds of pancakes as fast as we could and never got outside the food truck. We heard the breakfast was a success and the "bonding" session held afterwards with Corps members was great; many of the alumni got to tell some of the great stories from the past. Wish we could have been there, but then it was time to start getting things ready for the lunch guests. We left with Mary Cloyd to do the mail run, so we missed the lunch and pretty much got back in time to help start dinner and get ready to go to the Rose Bowl.

The ride to the Rose Bowl took a little over an hour. The weather was great and everyone seemed to be having a great time looking over the promo booths, spotting old friends and making new ones. By arriving so late, we did not get to see many corps before the Blue Devils, but we were enjoying ourselves. When it was time for the Devs to perform, we could not believe the audience response. The other corps was just starting to come off the field when the first sight of blue appeared at the opening of the tunnel. The crowd starting yelling "Bring on the Blue Devils" and the cheering kept getting louder and louder all throughout the show – at the end, the roar was unbelievable. One new Corps member said he could feel the crowd's excitement throughout the show and when the last note was played, he looked up to see a stadium full of standing, cheering people – and he could not help but start to cry for joy. We have to admit, this was the first time ever we found ourselves actually in tears at Quarter Finals. They were so good! We went home with a first-place score of 97.20. Friday was another day with lots more people coming by to be with the kids and to watch rehearsals. More parents, more friends. The kids were feeling pretty good about the night before, but realized they could not let up one bit as the other corps were looking great. We had to leave early as we had tickets for Semi-Finals and wanted to get there in plenty of time. While in line, we started a conversation with a gentleman selling the DCI Yearbooks. Out of the thousands of people we could have talked to, he happened to be the father of one of the young men who stayed with us for try-outs! So many things of this nature happened all throughout the week and it would take way too much space to tell them all. Amazing!

Our seats for the show were in the 60th row and the stadium appeared to be full of drum corps loving people. It was fun talking to everyone around us as it seemed everyone was from a different corps. We were a bit concerned about the field as many of the kids said the field was slippery and there were grass seams they had to watch out for (several kids from many of the corps slipped or fell the night before). When the Blue Devils came onto the field, the entry response of the crowd was not as tremendous as before, but it was soon obvious the Corps was putting on a heck of a show. Our score was 97.30, only a small margin ahead of the Cadets. Was the Corps upset? No, they just vowed to do a better show the next night. The age-out ceremony is always an amazing sight. The Blue Devils had 52 age-outs on that field. We were also treated to a fantastic performance by the very large and very good Anaheim Kingsmen alumni. Wow! What was especially touching was the fact that on the same night and field Corps member Tom Crew marched with the Blue Devils, his father marched with the Kingsmen Alumni. How often does this happen?

Saturday was a day of cleaning all the little bits and pieces in the show. The daytime weather was hot all week, and it was amazing these kids were able to expend the amount of energy they did all day long. Thank goodness the evenings were cool. Again, there was a very large audience for the rehearsal. We got to the stadium with just enough time to check out the promo booths (again), get a drink and meet up with the Corps. If we thought the Thursday night crowd was loud yelling for the Devs, it didn't compare to what the kids heard as they came onto the field. All this energy was not wasted as it seemed to be bouncing back and forth between the audience and the Corps while they were performing. What a show! As the Corps came off the field, they were able to pick up all the medals, cameras, etc. that Sheryl Miles had gotten to the stadium (this is a difficult chore in itself). Each Corps member had a zip-lock bag with their name, so it was a little easier getting everything to the right person. As is our tradition, it was our pleasure to present each of the age-outs with a white rose corsage for the ladies and a white rose boutonniere for the gentlemen. This is a highly emotional time for us as we know this may very well be the last time we get to interact with the kids we have grown to love – so we pin the flower on them, give them a quick hug, kiss, tell them thank you and try to let them know how much we love them. One has to be there to realize just how much goes on between the show and retreat; it's an extremely short period of time before the Corps has to go back on the field and there's lots to do—FAST!

RETREAT: We were doing pretty good as the first few scores were announced, but the hands started shaking and the stomach started aching a bit more as each subsequent score was announced. It took forever to announce the score between third and second place. Torture!! “And in second place with a score of 97.025” (big pause) – OK, the heart felt as though it had stopped beating – “The Cadets.” Elation abounded. The elusive #12 was ours and well earned. We all joined in when the announcement was made: “Blue Devils, the field is YOURS.” We can't thank Terry Maurer enough for making it possible to be on the field during retreat and to be able to join our BD sons and daughters at their time of celebration. Coming off the field, a large number of the members gave us a hug, kiss and a thank you. Tears? You bet, but we wouldn't have traded this night for anything.

We were popping our buttons with pride, but soon realized just exactly how proud we were of these young people. We have included an article written by Michael Boo regarding what happened after the Victory Gig and how the Corps members responded to two young Marines who wanted to meet the Blue Devils. Each member stopped their own celebration, went over to shake the Marines' hands, thank them for everything, wish them safe journey to and return from Iraq, and let them know they would be praying for their safety. We also wished these young men well and told them they would be in our daily prayers. There was not a dry eye anywhere around. This was one of the most touching things we have ever witnessed. We were (and are) so proud, it actually hurt.

So there it was – Finals had come and gone and we are left with memories galore. Yes, it was quite a year.

SPIRIT FROM JSU – The black and white uniforms were quite attractive. We have enjoyed watching this corps since it was the Spirit From Atlanta, and they have come a long way. It was a very enjoyable show to watch.

GLASSMEN – Was surprised the guard stayed with the rather bulky Gypsy uniforms throughout the entire show. We really expected some sort of uniform change. Did not care for the antics during the warm-up period. Guard detracted from the corps.

COLTS – Didn't care for the swaying of the corps during the warm-up period. The red shakos and plumes were different. The music toward the end of the show was thoroughly enjoyable.

BOSTON CRUSADERS – Thoroughly enjoyed the corps' performance. However, did not really get into the frame props, although it was what the show theme was.

BLUE KNIGHTS – Loads of corps action. We had a different reaction from the last time we saw the corps. Finals night was very well done and extremely enjoyable. We still miss the "dots."

BLUECOATS – Right at the top of our favorite show of the evening. The corps and guard were excellent. The vocals were very well done and did not detract from (but added to) the show. The entire show was just down right fun. Congratulations to the show designer for designing a show that will stay in our memory. Can't wait to get the DVD so we can watch this show over and over.

CAROLINA CROWN – Wasn't too sure about the start of this show, but found we were enjoying it more and more as it progressed. Impressive long horn note. The highlight, of course, was the horse race at the end. We were wondering if the winning horse changed with each show! Another fun show.

SANTA CLARA VANGUARD – Thought this corps did an excellent job. Personal feeling is that the corps just got so good at the very beginning of the season, that they were not able to make a lot of new improvements. We liked them at the beginning of the season, and we liked them at the end. Very Vanguard.

PHANTOM REGIMENT – Again, did not care for the bird antics during the warm-up period. Have always enjoyed the Phantom drill, and this was no exception. Interesting guard uniform change.

THE CAVALIERS – Enjoyed the show, but expected far more from the guard. The Billy Joel show was smooth, but did not come across as exciting as we anticipated. The guard is usually quite energetic in nature; they had some rifle tosses that were something else!

THE CADETS – Did not care for the vocalizing. Perhaps it was too much and extremely difficult to understand what was being said. Thought it totally distracted the audience's attention from what was a very good show. We have never been totally taken with this corps' style, but found ourselves enjoying the corps more than in previous years drill-wise.

THE BLUE DEVILS – We are biased, of course! However, we have always been honest with the Corps members and ourselves as to if they were good or not. Finals night, they were HOT! The energy and determination came through loud and clear. Felt the guard work was never given the credit for what they did – high tosses, head choppers, etc. This Corps has a reputation of making difficult things look easy. This performance was certainly of a championship nature.

Two things we felt were a bit overdone by most of the corps: Distracting/not really necessary antics during the warm-up period and so much rolling on the ground by both guards and musicians. While we offer more negative comments than normal, this does not indicate any negative feelings toward any of the corps' performances. Every corps did an outstanding job and is to be congratulated on being in the top 12. We all appreciated their efforts and know they all worked equally as hard throughout the year.

Finals Night in Pasadena, California was a great drum corps night. There were 12 of the finest corps in the nation performing their hearts out and about 35,000 people watching the best of the best.

“I have to personally thank David Gibbs and the entire Blue Devils organization for something that happened after Finals last night.

Through someone I met the day before, I ended up interviewing two United State Marines who had never before been to a drum corps show. (This will be on DCI.org in a few days after I have a chance to remember how to breathe again.) The person that introduced me had purchased tickets for them and got them out here for Finals from the east coast – along with one of their mothers – in order so they might witness their first ever drum corps show.

Both Marines were stationed in Iraq for some time and were on leave. They return to Iraq next week. They were totally blown away by what they saw in the Rose Bowl.

During the interview, one mentioned the thing they wished more than anything before going back to Iraq was to meet the Blue Devils. Because there was really nothing to think about, I got them to the field (security called the supervisor and they were let down the steps when the supervisor heard their story...thank you Rose Bowl security) and I talked with David Gibbs and told him their story.

Now keep in mind a few things, please. Blue Devils had just won the World Championship. They only had a few minutes on the field before they had to leave the field. They were still in the process of congratulating each other and starting saying their personal good-byes. They had every right to not want their own celebration intruded upon by someone they didn't know. And David Gibbs was trying to keep everything on schedule and certainly didn't need to be distracted.

After allowing three minutes for members to have photographs taken, he told the corps about the two Marines. They were introduced, the entire corps clapped, and then ... during their own celebration ... the kids came up to shake the Marines' hands and wish them safe journey back to and in Iraq.

I don't mind admitting I was crying during this, as was the one Marine's mom and the person who arranged for them to be in Pasadena and his friend.

Even in time of their own personal bonding, Blue Devils saw the bigger picture and realized what they meant to the two Marines who had never before seen a drum corps show and who would be back facing unlimited danger next week.

Blue Devils reminded me why I'm so proud to be part of this activity. Thank you David Gibbs. Thank you Blue Devils. You all are class people and I'm proud to know you.

And Godspeed to our service people around the world.”

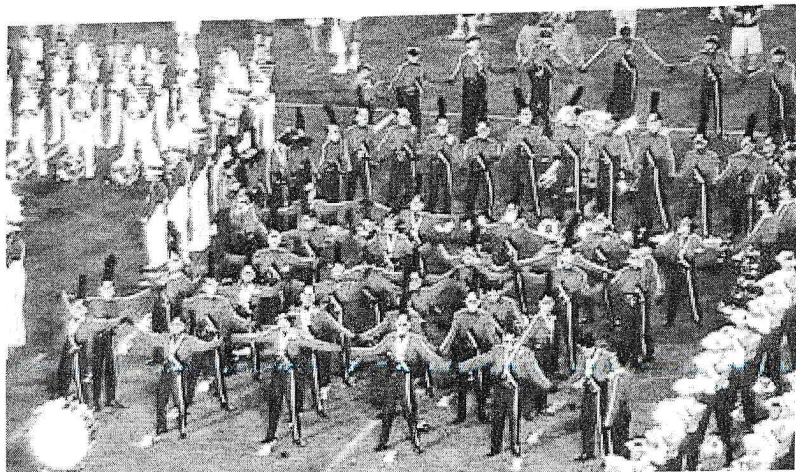
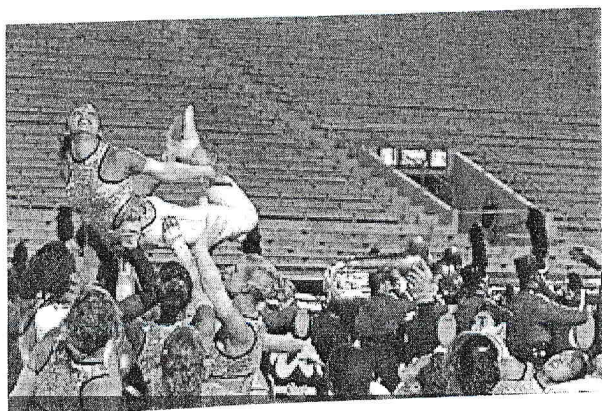
